Key Knowledge and vocabulary	
Habitat	The natural home or environment of an animal or plant
Environment	All the things that surround animals and humans in the world, including the air, the water, and the soil
Predator	An animal that naturally preys on others, such as a seal preying on fish
Prey	An animal that is hunted and killed by another for food
Hunt	To pursue or chase an animal or for food
Climate	The weather conditions usually found in an area over a long period of time
Animal	A living thing that feed on plants or other animals
