- There was a Great Fire in London in 1666 and that the River Thames runs through London.


At the end of the unit, I will be able to:

A bird's eye view of London

Buckingham Palace is the official home of the Queen.

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Westminster Abbey is a large church.

It is used by the Royal Family for weddings, coronations and funerals. Many kings and queens are buried in Westminster Abbey.

The Palace of Westminster is made up of the Houses of Parliament, the House of Lords and Elizabeth Tower. Big Ben is the bell inside the tower.

The Tower of London is a very old castle on the banks of the river Thames. The Queen keeps her precious jewels here.

The London Eye is a modern ferris wheel. When you get to the top of the wheel you can see all over London.

Vocabulary		
country	An area of land with boundaries which fits within a continent.	
city	A large town that that has been given the title city from the crown. A capital city is the main city of a country. London is the capital city of England.	
landmark	A human or physical feature which is well known in an area and can represent that place.	
human feature	A human Feature in Geography is something that humans have created or built, such as a housing estate or parks.	
physical feature	Physical features in geography include oceans, mountains, lakes, rivers, streams, hills and volcanoes.	
map	A diagram to show where places are located and features of places.	
compass	A magnetic instrument used for finding direction, having a magnetic needle which points to the magnetic north	
navigate	To plan and follow a route. You can use maps or landmarks to navigate around a place.
